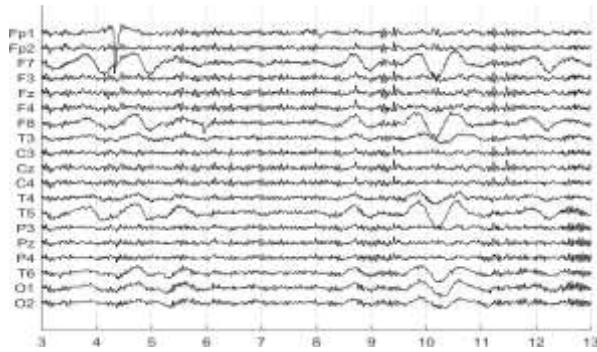

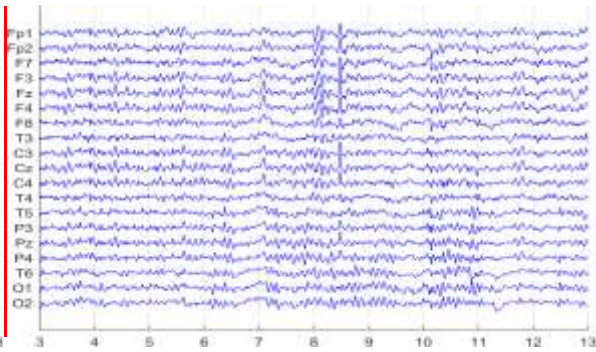

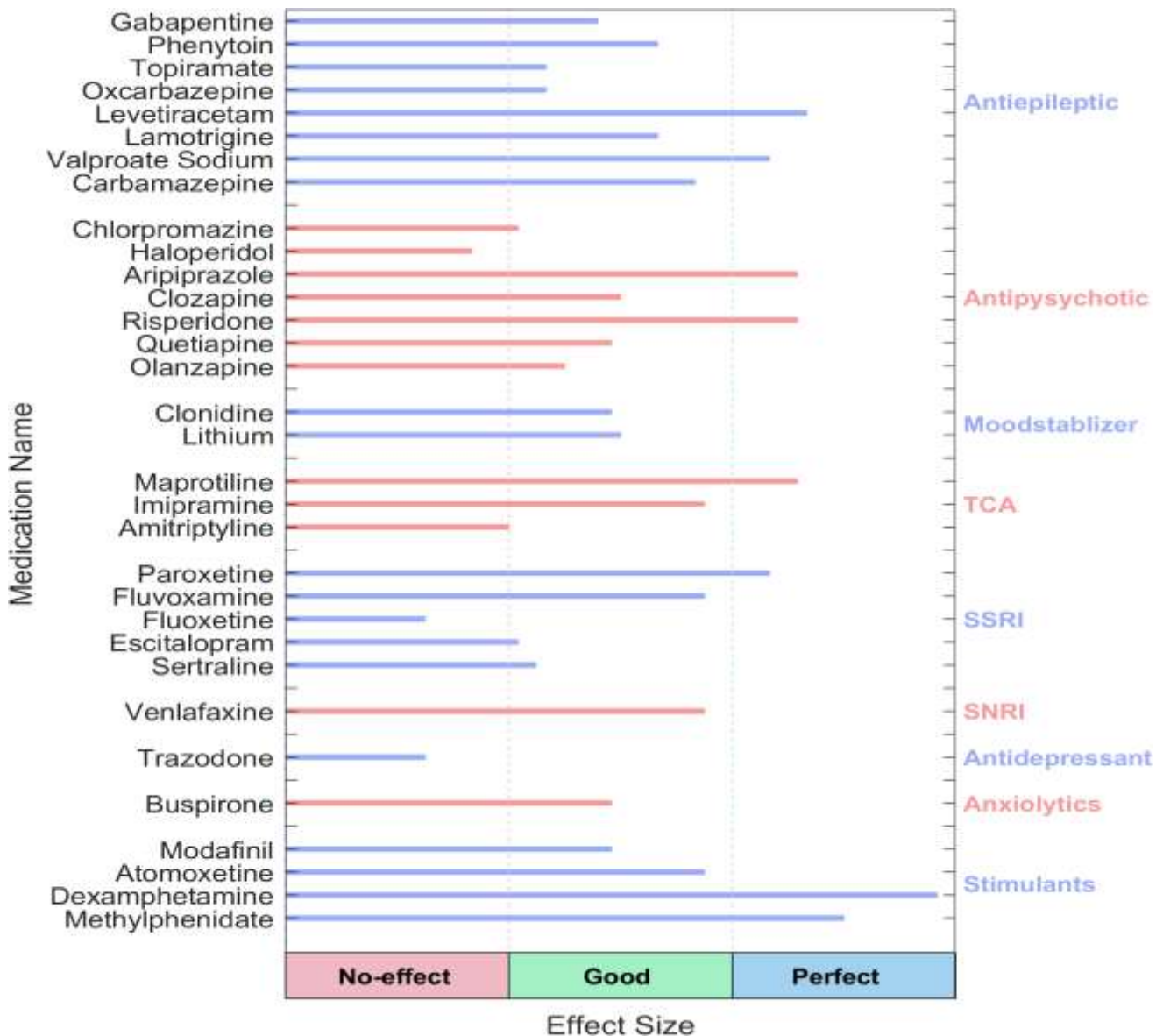

QEEG based predicting medication response



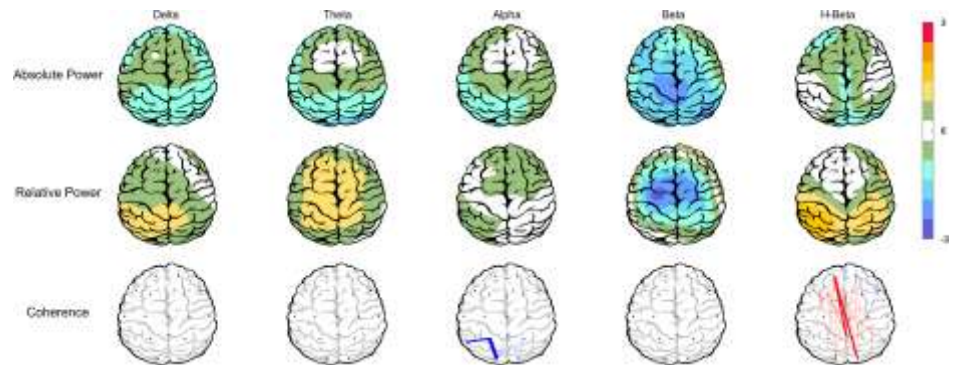
Explanation

To prepare this list, the NPCIndex Article Review Team has studied, categorized, and extracted algorithms from many authoritative published articles on predict medication response and Pharmacology EEG studies. These articles are published between 1970 and 2021. The findings extracted from this set include 85 different factors in the raw band domains, spectrum, power, coherence, and loreta that have not been segregated to avoid complexity, and their results are shown in these diagrams. 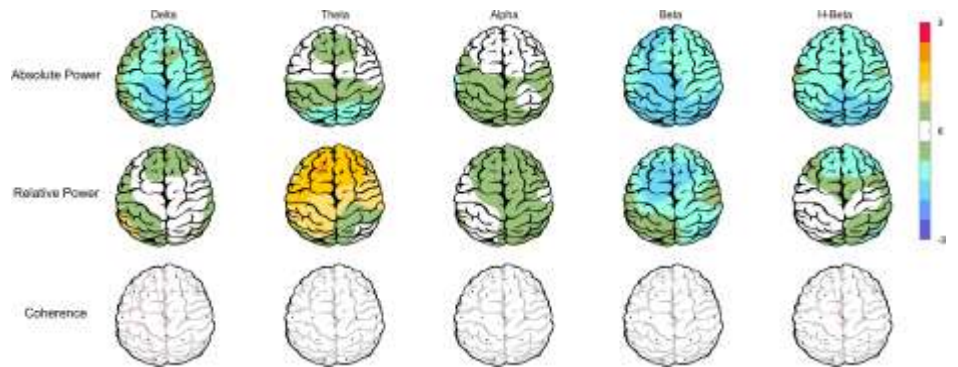
Medication Recommendation

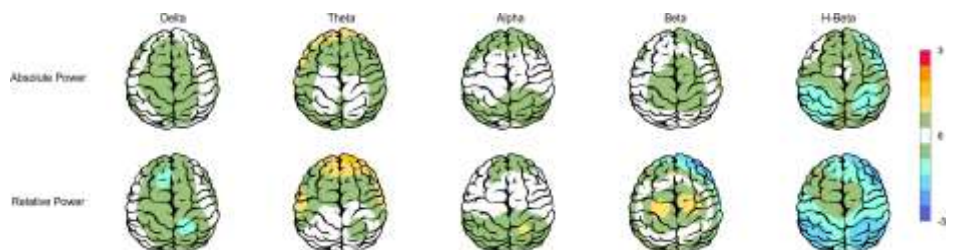
First Topographic Map



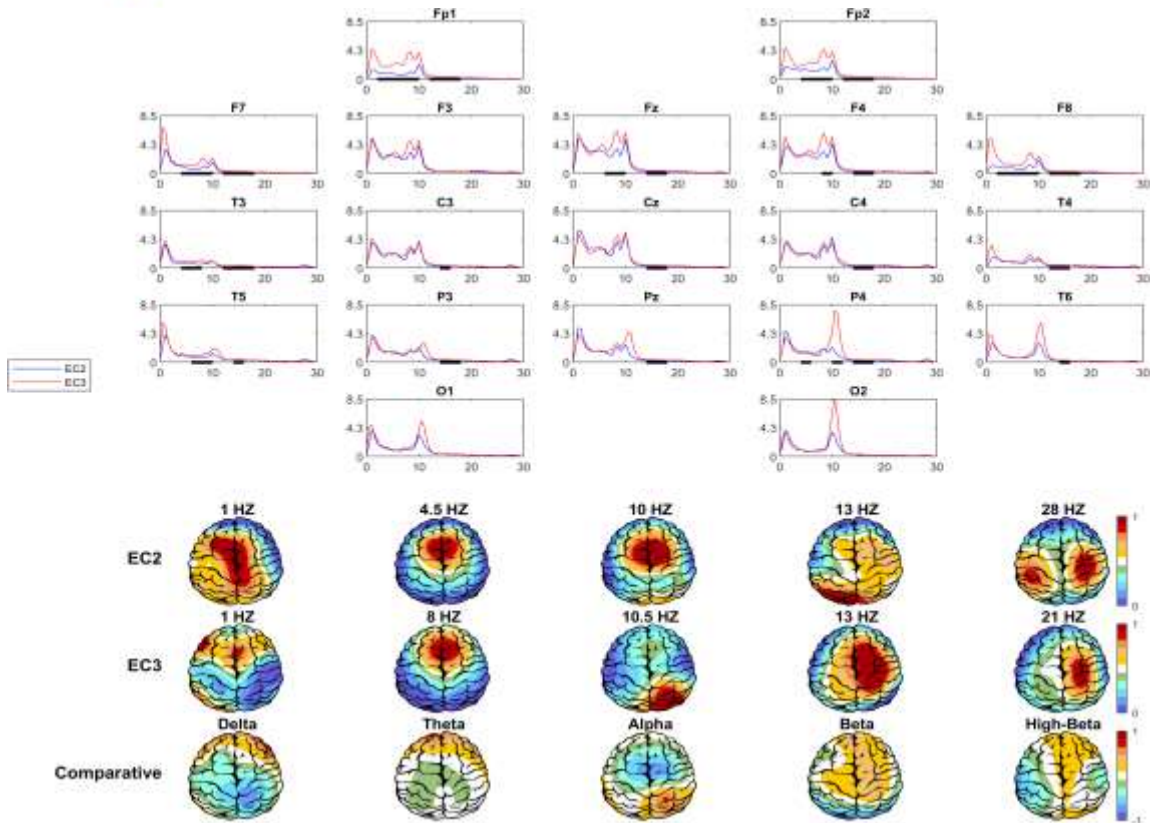
Second Topographic Map



Comparsion Topographic Map



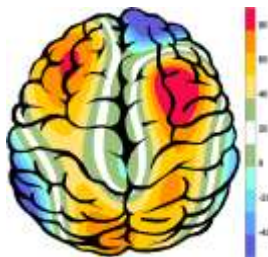
Power Spectrum
