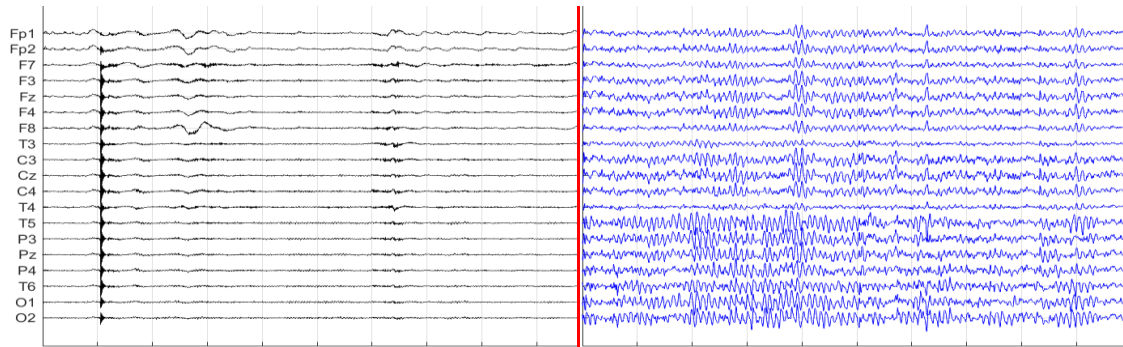

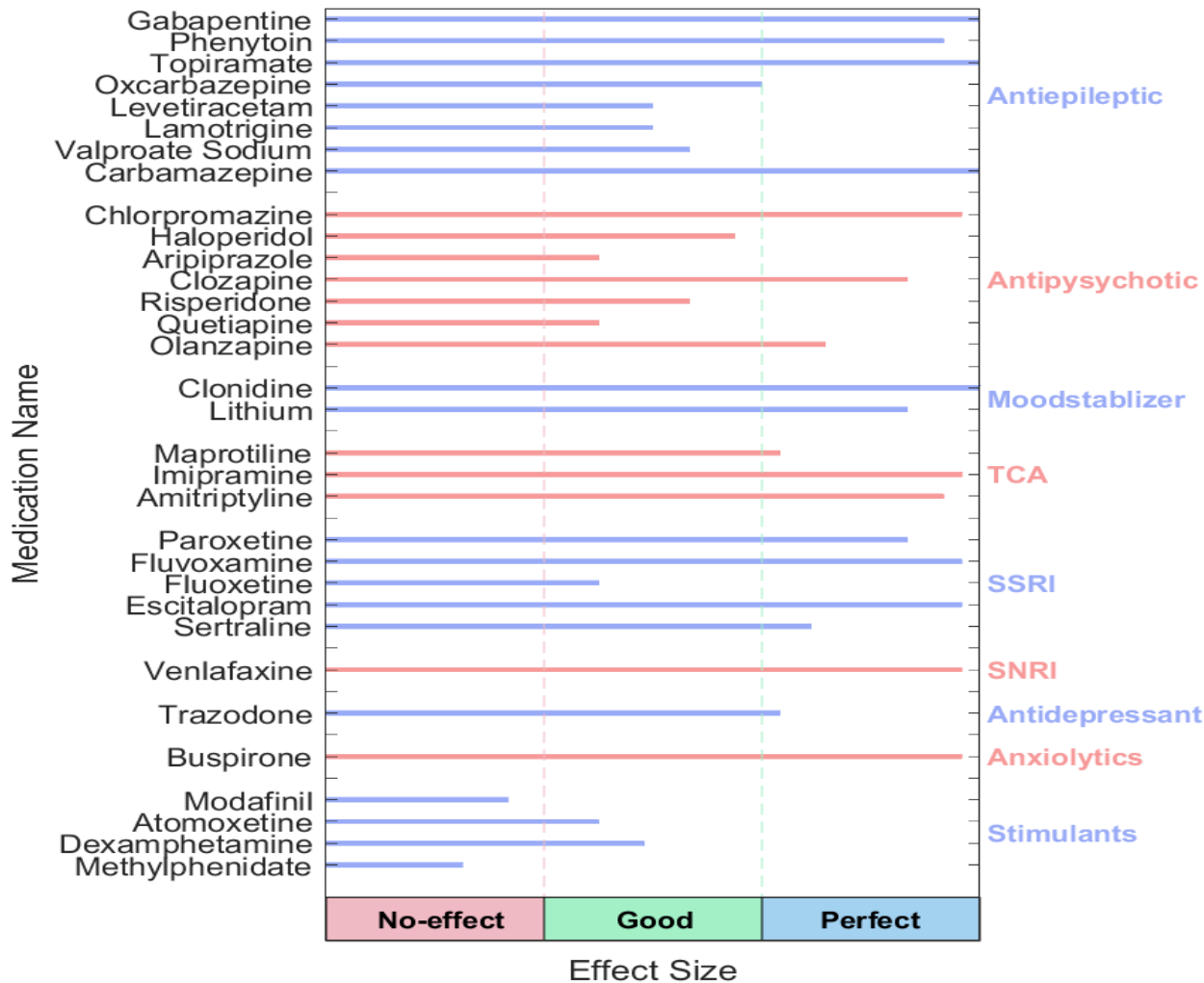

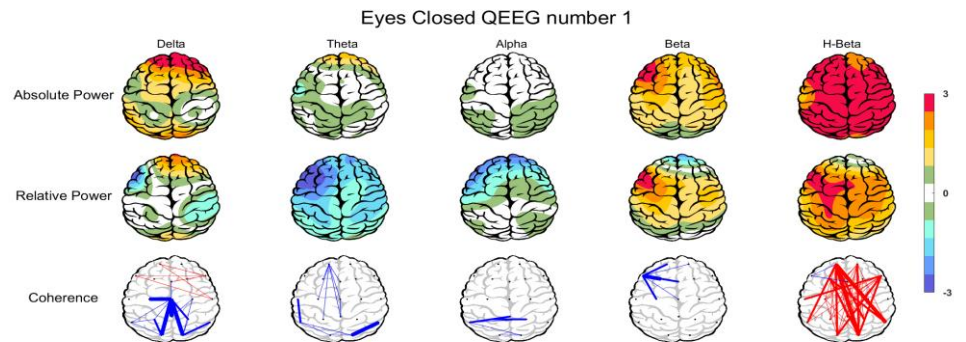

To prepare this list, the NPCIndex Article Review Team has studied, categorized, and extracted algorithms from many authoritative published articles on predict medication response and Pharmacoe EEG studies. 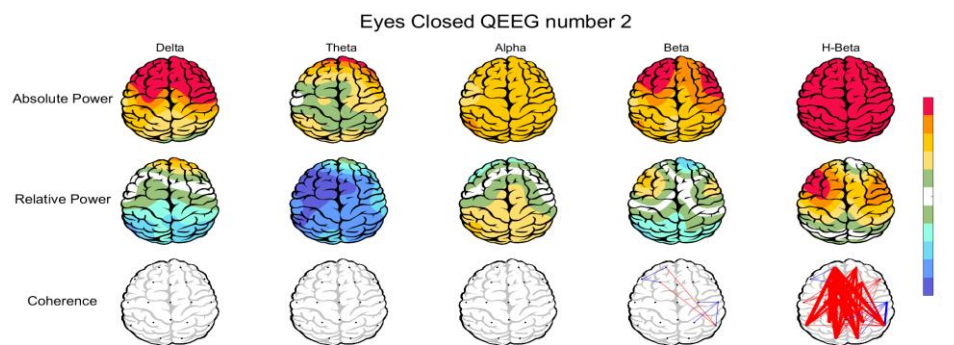
Medication Recommendation

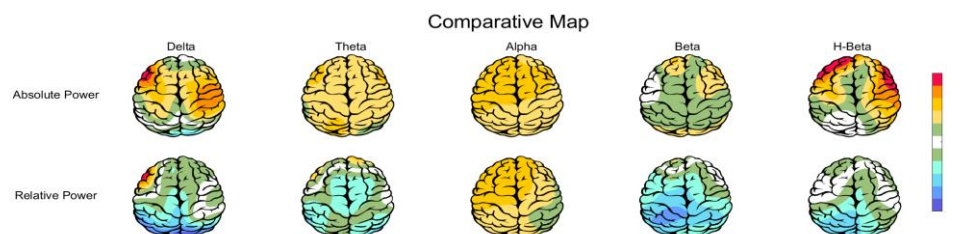
First Topographic Map



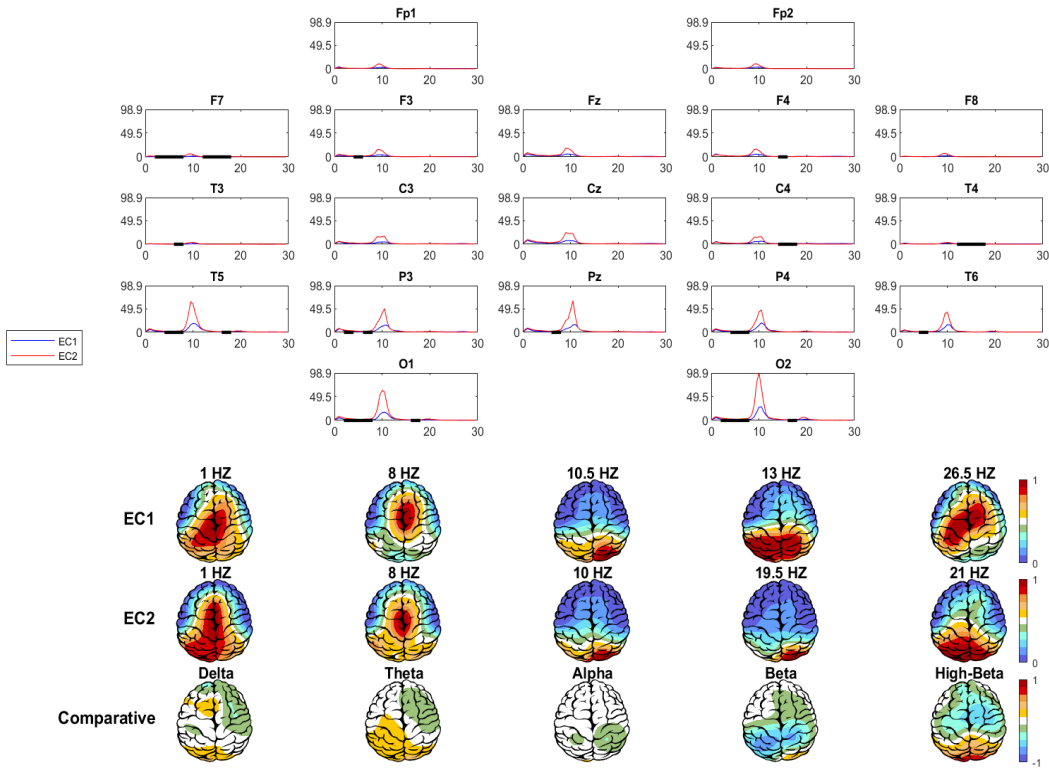
Second Topographic Map



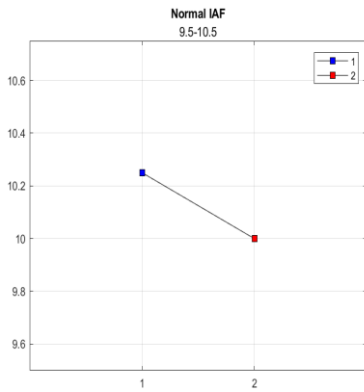
Comparsion Topographic Map



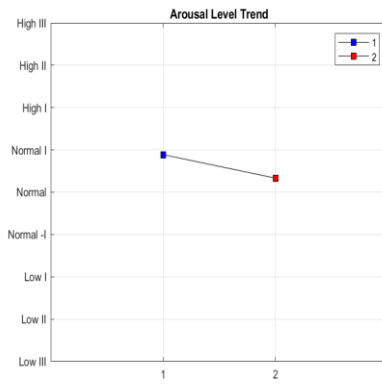
Power Spectrum



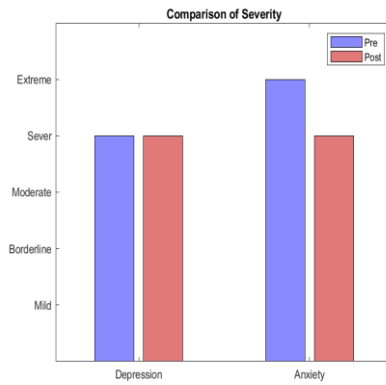

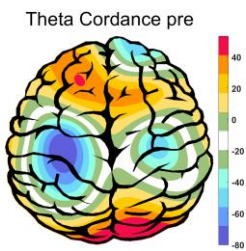
Arousal Level



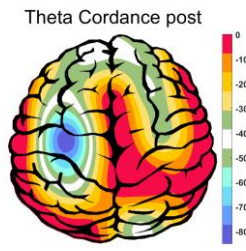
Depression and Anxiety Severity
